DTCS High School Students Tour Post-Secondary Institutions

DTCS provided opportunity for HS student to apply for a field trip to tour post-secondary institutions in Edmonton along with the Junior High School attending the Dream Catcher's Youth Conference, October 16-19.

Ms. Shirley Joyce A. arranged for the educational and career field trip. Fourteen students were qualified to participate during this event. Students were accompanied by Mr. MacDonald-VP, Ms. Jenoure-HS teacher and Mr. Mangaser-Gr.8/9 teacher. Participants had the opportunity to travel to Edmonton to tour three post-secondary institutions-University of Alberta; Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, and Grant McEwan University.

Students were able to explore a wide variety of career programs at these schools. They were able to gain firsthand knowledge from both the program instructors and more importantly, students enrolled in the programs. They learned they had an almost limited range of career possibilities and



options. They were made aware that it was extremely competitive to be accepted into most programs. These programs are very challenging to be successful. Student experienced aspects of campus life, including the being on a very large site with a lot of students. They were aware of support systems in place to assist with success including transition programs as well as on-campus support centers for indigenous students.

In addition to seeing post-secondary options firsthand, the goals of the trip were to make student aware of the importance of completing high school with good marks in the right courses, setting

realistic career goals and taking responsibility for their own learning and success.

Career planning, completing the required high school pre-requisites and achieving the mark standards create a direct route to student success. Positive student choices, regular attendance and achieving good

marks in high school are extremely important to be successful in the challenging environment of postsecondary education.

The trip also included a stop at the Alberta Legislature and visitor's center special effects presentation. These opportunities will contribute somehow to their vicarious experiences and be part of their unforgettable memories.

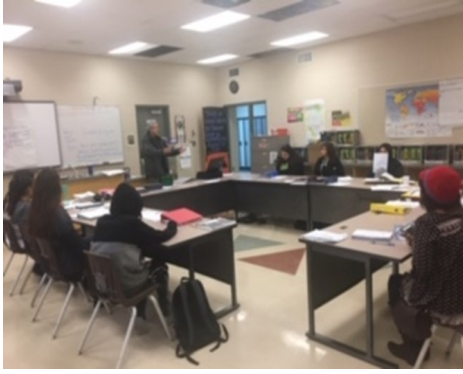

The councilor focused on the importance of Education and the life of the future generation that they are losing their

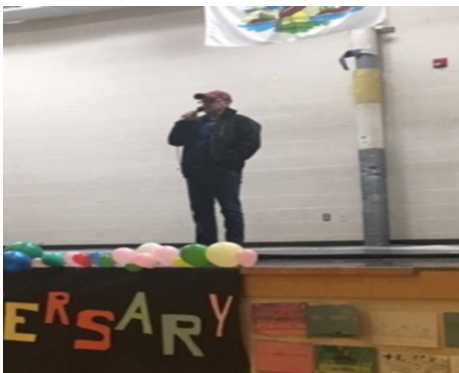
identity due to globalization. He encouraged the young people to stay in the school like what he has been doing taking his Master’s Program in Business Management.

DTCS students had the opportunity to attend the Paradigm Esteem: The Art of Being Me program, provided by Amanda W., a modelling company from Spruce Grove, Alberta, October 7-11.

The Program is funded by the DTFN Community and Wellness, initiated by Ms. Linda S. This annual self-esteem

program seemed to be integrated in the lives of young people and it has motivated more young people to be engaged not only at the DTCS but also in Meander River.

Low self-esteem can affect just about every aspect of a youth's life. If they feel bad or are unsure of themselves, then they may be unable to participate fully in any activity for fear of failure. Youth cannot handle everything perfectly all the time and shouldn't be expected to. They don't have to try to face up to what everyone else 'thinks' they should be, but should make sure they are PROUD of their decisions, actions and more importantly themselves. Self-esteem programs help youth discover who they truly are by using our methods of looking inside of their 'shell', and by allowing a stronger sense of 'self'. By combining techniques such as fashion modeling and self-esteem lessons allows

the two mediums to come together resulting in outer and inner strength.

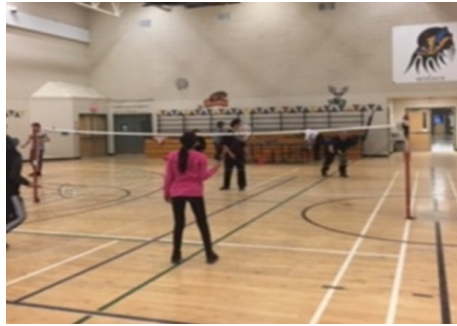
The 'Art' of Being Me focuses on topics including: Making Your Self-Esteem Work for You; The Art of Appreciation; The Power of Positive Thinking; Martial Arts - Defending what is yours mentally and physically; Why post-secondary is worth the effort; The real cost of Drugs, Alcohol and Addictions; Life can change suddenly - how to adapt; Career versus just a 'job'; What is a budget?

The Program culminated with fashion which was joined by the parents and guardians of the community members.

In addition, high school students that successfully completed the program earned credits toward graduation.

During our Professional Development Day, our staff have the opportunity to plan strategically and learn various ways on how to improve services to our children. The PAX Pilot Project has also a regular staff visiting our school to monitor the effect of behaviour strategies being implemented regularly by the teacher to eliminate behavioural problem so that they could focus more on academic learning. Confident Learner Program also has been implemented. Our school is conducting Early Years Evaluation (EYE) to our young learners to determine exactly their learning capability to have quality and relevant instruction for them to be successful.

Our qualified Junior High School and Senior High School students also went for an educational field trip to Edmonton. They went for a tour at University of Alberta. Jr. High School attended the Dream Catcher at MacEwan University while Sr. High School went to the Open House at Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT). This field trip enabled our students to look farther towards the future. Their experience will be in-

valuable and somehow, someday they will further their education and will enrol in the Post Secondary Programs.

This month, the school celebrated its 17th Year of Founding Anniversary. The theme was “ Honouring Education and Learning Spaces for our Children”. The event hoped to send the message to young people to take care of the building and ensure its beauty for more generations to come. Also, It aimed to thank the founders who sacrificed their invaluable time and effort to establish the school. Our EDO James R , Councillor Andrea G and Councillor Shane P. were in attendance.

Head-start students have been learning through play by exercising their hands with play dough. Play dough makes it easier for them to hold a pencil properly while tracing their names, shapes,

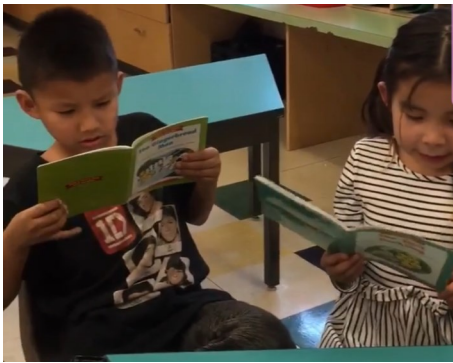
numbers 1-10, and the letter of the week (C, and soon to be D). Students show improvements within the last few weeks. Way to go Head-start students! :)

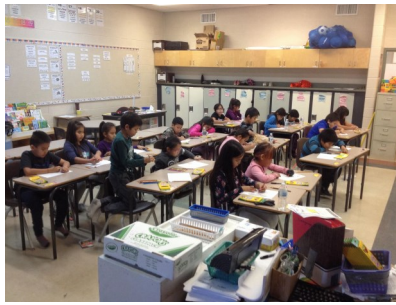


M. White instructs the Grade 1 students for the day's activity in the Action Chill room.

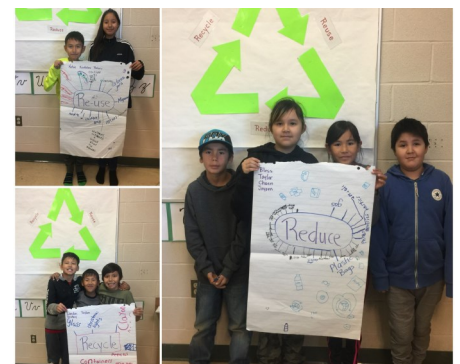

The

students are also learning their multiplication facts in math and place value to 10,000. They also have started the Read 180 program, System 44 and Essential Skills and they seem to be adapting to the program very well. In Science, we have compared coniferous trees against deciduous trees and studied how the nutrient cycle and photosynthesis work. We have also examined leaf shapes and arrangements

as well as branching patterns and will soon be studying tree cookies to interpret the growth of a young tree. In Art, we are learning about tints and shades of colours. We do this by knowing how to use black and white to make colour values and also how to use these in creating perspective in a painting. In PE, we are starting our basketball season and so, we will be working on our basketball skills. As for Health & Life Skills, we looked into our eating habits and health habits/behaviours that might influence body image and feelings of self-worth.

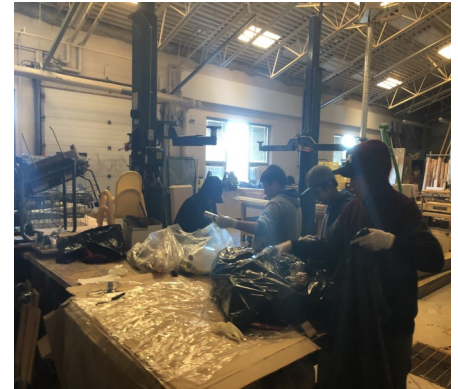
Grade 8/9

Students will be preparing for tests in November and working on debating skills.

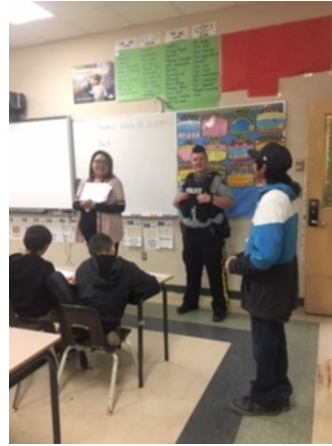
